SENATOR HALL: Madam President, yes, Senator Robinson, how did you vote on the last bill? You didn't vote on it, right? You chastise (inaudible)...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Are you asking me a question?

SENATOR HALL: No, I'm not, 'cause I've looked it up already.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay...okay, you want my answer?

SENATOR HALL: Thank you very much.

SENATOR ROBINSON: You want my answer?

SENATOR HALL: Sit down.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay...

SENATOR HALL: No, you had your point of personal privilege.

SENATOR ROBINSON: ...forget it then.

SENATOR HALL: I take great exception. You're chastising the rest of the body for purposes of whether they're here or not. You have to be here to vote; then vote! On a tough issue you sit on your hands. You don't push your button, but yet you got the belly to stand up and tell the rest of us that we should have been here to vote! Thank you, sir. I don't need that, not at ten o'clock in the morning, not at four o'clock in the afternoon. If it's so important to vote on the issue then vote, push the button one way or the other. Make up your mind. Let your constituents know how you feel on the issue, but after you
