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comes down to a matter of, again, I feel that the bill is unnecessary and there are some very important issues that need to be addressed and I think we should get on, therefore, I support the motion to indefinitely postpone. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Madam President, and members of the body, one time I heard a definition of perfect legislation and that definition basically was comprised of several parts, it did nothing, it cost nothing, and it made everyone feel good by doing it. When this section of statute was put in place in 1955, be reminded that the state did regulate working conditions, did have a voice, in some manner, in the operations of railroads in the State of Nebraska. It's January 28, 1993, I'm a little curious and it may be addressed by some other speaker as to what perhaps regulations the Department of Labor might promulgate and if they did so spend the person hours in drafting and holding the hearings and everything, and proceeded to adopt such regulations, how...what form they might take, but most importantly, under the current mechanism, federal law, federal regulations that govern the operation of the interstate transportation systems, in this case the railroad, how in the world would they go about enforcing such regulations. It's a...this is a curiosity to me because I really, like Senator Ashford, can see no purpose to this particular piece of legislation and would support its indefinite postponement. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator. Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Madam President, again, to take just a minute literally and not much longer than that, Senator Vrtiska, I mean this with all good and perfect intent, the reason that we're not getting anywhere is because we had one motion to indefinitely postpone, we had one motion to refer to committee, we have now another motion to indefinitely postpone. And if we would have been allowed to simply debate the bill and vote on the bill, we would be adjourned and in our offices at this point because we would have finished the other bills. You know, I understand that some people just don't like a bill, but in our process that's why we have a red button. If we don't like a bill, we vote no. If we're afraid of a bill, we move it to be indefinitely postponed. And all I'm asking people to do is two things. The frustration that you're having now on it's a kind
