ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read LB 472 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 472 pass with the emergency clause attached? All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read record vote as found on pages 1479-80 of the Legislative Journal.) The vote is 42 ayes, 0 nays, 1 present and not voting, 6 excused and not voting.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 472 passes with the emergency clause attached. That completes Final Reading. I would like to call the senators' attention to the south balcony. Special guests today of Senator Abboud are 47 students from the fourth grade at Sandoz Elementary in Omaha and their teachers. Would you please rise and be recognized. Welcome to the Chamber. Thank you. While the Legislature is in session and capable of conducting business, I propose to sign and do sign LB 268, LB 623, LB 387, LB 435, and LB 472E. We'll now proceed with Select File. LB 831.

CLERK: Senator Hohenstein, I have no amendments to 831.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Hohenstein.

SENATOR HOHENSTEIN: I move that 831 be advanced to E & R for engrossing.

PRESIDENT MOUL: You've heard the motion to advance LB 831. Senator Wesely, you wish to be recognized.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you. Madam President, members, I guess I'd like to ask Senator Moore a question on this. I...over in the Health Committee, I apologize for bringing it up like this, but I know there was some discussion about the bill. But this is more money into the county computer system. And in the Health and Human Service side we've been talking to the Department of Social Services about the FAMIS program they're trying to work on, and some of the efforts there. I know some other agencies have been working on computer upgrades. And can you give a status of how this county computer program plugs into some of the other things. Is there going to be some effort to
