And my godchild told him, this is going to be my godfather and it will be done here, and he shook and quaked and got his way through it and when he was pouring the oil on her forehead, I had the little silver dish and caught the oil and dabbed off her forehead, got the little candle in the box that commemorated the day. I'm her godfather. She wanted me to be her godfather. I loo' out for her and that, I think, is appropriate. That's empowering, but it's not me standing up here saying no matter what circumstances a young woman finds herself in the Legislature knows better and, by god, we're going to run her through the gauntlet and make her sorry she came into this world as a female child.

SPEAKER BAACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I rise to support this amendment. I don't think Senator Lindsay was here when I was speaking before about my concerns of promising child support to the woman coming in seeking an abortion. But, as he got up to speak about the financial incentives to have an abortion, I think it's only fair to point out that earlier we talked about the financial incentives offered to the woman in order not to have an abortion and how those are very oftentimes not real and certainly incentives that are not realized. And so I think that LB 110 also has financial incentives that are offered to a woman in order not to seek an abortion and so it's not a one-way street. Also, Senator Lindsay said that he did not have first-hand experience. I understand that and that's why I think it might have been interesting to have the women senators of this Legislature to have brought forth a recommendation as to what to do on this bill because it's very true that none of the men here who are speaking on this bill have had any first-hand experience. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Bohlke. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, here is what I wish that I could persuade my colleagues to consider--the total inappropriateness of requiring this kind of information to be a part of the physician-patient relationship. Senator Bohlke said what a number of the women senators have said from time to time, that the men are doing all of this talking. All we can do is the best that we can and, if I error, I'm going to error on the
