SENATOR CUDABACK: How it's...

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...work in the lesser populated areas of Nebraska.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I guess, how is what going to work?

SENATOR COORDSEN: This bill. Because if a licensed electrician cannot employ anyone other than an apprentice to help them, and most of these things do take two or more people to wire a house or any of the other...of the other things, so that the only assistant that they could have other than someone to unload the pickup, but anyone to assist them in hands-on installation of any electrical device, service, wiring, would have to be at the minimum an apprentice electrician.

SENATOR CUDABACK: He has to apply for that apprentice, correct. He can...if he's not a journeyman, apprentice is an apprentice, we all know what that means. If you're working, well, then you are an apprentice, it can only be three to one. That's the way it is, and if he's working on the job, he can be an apprentice. If he's not there, he's not an apprentice, I guess.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Well, I'll bet you money, marbles and chalk that a year from now...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...we're going to be revisiting this, making corrections because of the outcry on the part of licensed electricians in the lesser populated areas of Nebraska when they find that they're not going to be able to hire someone to help them install whatever it is that they are certainly qualified to oversee and to see that it's installed, but they won't be able to hire any help.
