CLERK: Mr. President, 632, first thing I have are Enrollment and Review amendments.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Hohenstein. Here he comes. Senator Hohenstein. We are on the E & R amendments to LB 632, please.

SENATOR HOHENSTEIN: I'd move the adoption of the E & R amendments to LB 632.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the motion to adopt the E & R amendments to LB 632. All those in favor say aye. Opposed no. They are adopted.

CLERK: Senator Landis would move to amend the bill.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, members of the Legislature, I have offered an amendment and I gave it yesterday. I am hoping that it was published. It is in the Journal, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: 1986, Senator.

SENATOR LANDIS: 1986, thank you. If you'll open your Journal to 1986 you'll see that this amendment cites various veterans' organization which have an interest in the handicapped parking situation and that they could be the labor force to help implement the measure. There are, on the other hand, several provisions which come from an original bill, LB 241, that had a number of cosponsorships here that recognized the American Ex-prisoners of War, the Military Order of the Purple Heart and the Vietnam Veterans of America as members of our veterans' council and I would urge the adoption of the amendment. There is a section in which the Legislature recognizes paralyzed veterans and other veterans' advocates as instrumental in the enactment of the law relating to handicapped parking infractions. They were part of the original lobbying force and that the Legislature urges the Department of Veterans Affairs to utilize existing resources towards encouraging recognized veterans' organizations to cooperating in achieving objectives of this law and then, of course, the recognition of the three veterans' organizations pursuant to the terms of LB 241, a bill that the Government Committee heard and reported out unanimously
