Mr. President, two communications from the Governor with respect to gubernatorial appointments. Those will be referred to reference for confirmation hearing assignment. That's all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We'll now proceed to LB 741.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 741 was a bill introduced by Senator Wesely and Hall. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 21, referred to the Revenue Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending to LB 741 by the Revenue Committee.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Warner, on the committee amendments.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, again, 741 was a bill which designated the use for revenue that was proposed in the bill and the committee amendment strikes those sections of the statute that designated the use and any funds generated would be deposited to the General Fund and if enacted, of course, could be used for whatever purpose the Legislature decided.
