SENATOR WESELY: It's not with FAMIS, but...

SENATOR MOORE: But will not the FAM...I mean, this is adding on another division of the computer services for DSS. Now it's my understanding FAMIS was to consolidate all of them and make things like this easier, cheaper, and more efficient to deal with in the future.

SENATOR WESELY: That's, that's, that's the intent. But this is adjunct, I was understand it to think. It would also have some eligibility cards in it. There, there's the comp...the computer thing, as you remember Senator Moore, on the copay, we would love to have copaying deductibles July 1. But they say they've got to have this to set up the system. And, and so I guess we need, need it for the computers and for the cards for eligibility. And that's what they've got in here. This is more than I would like, but that's what they're telling us...

SENATOR MOORE: And I'm just trying to, I mean, obviously, I think we're going to discuss the FAMIS computer system. And one thing for the record, it was my understanding, these type of overhauls will be more doable in the future.

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, oh yes. The answer is yes to that.

SENATOR MOORE: But, but...and so I mean, even if FAMIS had passed a year ago, was up and running, you'd still need a cost here. With passed, your FAMIS would likely be less, and more...and easier to do.

SENATOR WESELY: That's right.

SENATOR MOORE: Now your eligibility card issue, this is on eligibility cards?

SENATOR WESELY: Evidently part of the cost is.

SENATOR MOORE: Now does that allow for the point of purchase? Type of activity, that's something...that'd be something more than that.
