

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body, I rise in opposition to the Lindsay amendment, not because it isn't well-intentioned as are all Senator Lindsay's amendments, but the problem is the implementation of the collection of this, first off, if you're retired but you're practicing medicine, then you're not really retired I guess but maybe, maybe you are, but the question is going to be will it impede the ability to know if somebody should or shouldn't pay the \$100. It might be a collection question, but in addition, as he indicated, the Medical Association which doesn't necessarily like 805, but their feeling is we're all in it or we're not in it and they'd prefer just keeping it with everybody in it and again, we don't know how many people this might affect, what kind of loss of revenue there might be. It is a worthy amendment. It is not a bad amendment. It's just at this point I'd oppose it and ask you to oppose it as well.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Wesely. Senator Crosby, on the Lindsay amendment.
