SENATOR LINDSAY: The bill does not advance. Items for the record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a number of things, hearing notices from the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee, Education Committee and the Judiciary Committee. I have a proposed rules change by Senator Byars. That will be referred to the Rules Committee for its consideration. An announcement, Senator Warner wants the Revenue Committee to meet upon adjournment in Room 1520, Revenue Committee upon adjournment, Room 1520. Appropriations will meet in Room 1003 upon adjournment, Appropriations, Room 1003. New bills. (Read LBs 1080-1088 by title for the first time. See pages 305-07 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We had a request to pass over LB 286 so we will move to LB 663. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 663 was a bill originally introduced by Senator Moore. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 21 last year. At that time it was referred to the Judiciary Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. I do have committee amendments pending by the Judiciary Committee.

SENATOR HALL PRESIDING

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Lindsay, on the Judiciary Committee amendments. While you're getting ready for those, if I could make an announcement, please. The Speaker has put a letter in everyone's box, but has asked that this memo be announced over the system. The bill requests for bill drafting have to be in by noon on Tuesday, January 18th to guarantee that they will be ready for introduction prior to the last day or the tenth day of bill introduction on January 20th. So Tuesday at noon for bill requests, January 18th, to guarantee that they will be ready to be introduced by the last or the tenth day of bill introduction. Senator Lindsay, on the committee amendments to LB 663.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members, the committee amendments to LB 663 are in typical Scott Moore fashion, well ahead of their time. This year I think we've all seen that crime seems to be the issue de jure and how to stop crime. Well, it was well over a year ago that the esteemed senator from Seward of thereabouts offered a bill that would truly take a
