bill, that there's been a great burden of additional...a great additional burden placed on the Secretary of State or whoever would do this in this particular bill, in your recodification process? Is that the general tenure of what you would say the bill accomplishes?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, that's what I would say. I don't know what the Secretary of State would say. He might have a different...

I mean it's conceivable that there might need to be one additional staff member added to the Secretary of State's Office, to do some of this training that we've talked about. You know, presently it...it's either not happening, or it's happening through NACO. And I guess I, at least for one, think it properly belongs with the Secretary of State.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: So that's the intention of this bill. I'm just trying to get a sense of what you really have accomplished in terms of additional workload, or additional burden on whoever does it, in this case the Secretary of State. I was just trying to get a sense of how much more this bill moves us forward in terms of let's say bureaucracy, or red tape,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...that might be the common term.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right. I...I...you know, to be as candid as I can, Senator Wehrbein, I think it might require one more staff member. But I'm not sure about that, and...and wouldn't be until I knew more specifically what current staff members are doing right now in the Secretary of State's Office. But I don't see a huge influx here either.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, thank you.
