

have the ability to move from county to county without any oversight. It is just suspicion on the part of the law enforcement officer that a misdemeanor has taken place. What kind of things are we talking about with regard to misdemeanors? Now there is a number of them that I doubt if there is an infraction of the Barber Licensing Act, Senator Chambers, which is a misdemeanor, that somebody would chase you from Douglas into Sarpy or Washington County, but they could. And if you would cut my hair the way I've seen you wear yours from time to time, I would chase you, but it would not be with my automobile. The fact of the matter is that we lump everything as a misdemeanor so someone could shoplift in a local department store. The department store could report it to the police, the individual could be going out the door and getting into their car, and the policy of the store might be not to raise any ruckus but just to call the police. That individual could be chased across county lines for as little as a \$5 item, if that were the case. Yeah, it is a hypothetical. Probably that won't happen, but littering is also a misdemeanor. If a law enforcement officer knew that these provisions of the law were now in place, saw an individual throw something out of their car, I might actual agree with the fact that they ought to go after them, in that case, because I think littering is a horrendous violation of law, but not to the point where we are talking about high-speed chases. Stop, bend over, and pick it up yourself, I guess, would be my response to somebody who sees that happen. What we are talking about here is issues that relate to rules of the road but we don't limit it to that. We don't talk about misdemeanors that deal with rules that are limited to infractions as it relates to automobiles or trucks or travel of the highways. I mean illegal solicitation of votes is a misdemeanor, I guess, that we could be chased from county to county for, if we so choose. The issue is one of where do we draw the line, and I think the county is a great line at which to draw this issue as it relates to misdemeanors. You are talking about a huge, huge expansion of what the rights currently are. I mean there are a number, owning and operating a motor vehicle with an illegal sunscreen or glazing on the windows is a misdemeanor. Do you remember, some of you that have been here for a few years, remember the debate on that one that goes back four or five years when we fought like crazy over whether or not somebody's rear window of their pickup ought to be able to have a windshield screen on it, ought to be able to be glazed over. We put that in place because law enforcement officers said it...
