

SENATOR VRTISKA: Maybe more.

SENATOR HABERMAN: ...phone company, the phone company provides the enhanced system to whoever is in control of the 911...11...or 911?

SENATOR VRTISKA: That's right.

SENATOR HABERMAN: All...are you familiar whether all phone companies are available or can get this enhanced system?

SENATOR VRTISKA: No, I'm not. I don't have any idea because I know some of the exchanges may be older exchanges that may not be able to accommodate this. I'm not sure that they can.

SENATOR HABERMAN: And this shows up in the...whose office does the 911...911 show up in your...in the one you're talking about, whose office?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, many of them are out of the sheriff's office. The calls come into the sheriff's office where they have a dispatcher or maybe a jailer or somebody who is on duty anyway and it can be set up however you wish.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So whoever is in charge of the 911 has to make the effort to obtain the enhanced system. Is this correct?

SENATOR VRTISKA: That's right.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you very much, Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: You're welcome.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Haberman. Anyone else on the Kristensen amendment? Senator Kristensen, would you like to close?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes, Mr. Speaker, and members of the Legislature, very briefly, this amendment does two things but they're important things. One is that they do clean up and put the committee amendment into the proper form for us to consider and that is striking Section 2 of the bill, which was what our intent was to do. And the last part of this is I think very important for a number of people about where this money is going
