

the body, this amendment simply changes the original drafting of the A bill to meet what the Legislature decided at this point in time to be in 988. There are no changes in it. It simply brings us up to date to match the bill that we have now on Final Reading and I urge its adoption.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Robinson, your light is on.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Mr. President, members of the body, Senator Bernard-Stevens, would you tell me what the implications of this bill is in succeeding years if there is any? What is the fiscal impact?

SENATOR HALL: Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Next biennium.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Robinson, it will be registered in your bill book and I'm looking at it real fast here on 988. Actually, the way that we have it now for this particular year, the second part of this year it will be a natural gain in the budget. It will not be a loss at all and in the outlying years it will be now about a...it would be about a million-one and 2.7 in the outlying years. And I might add the reason it's that low is because of the decision that the body made on the boot camps.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Is that, the money in those three years, is that for the new building?

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Yes, that would be correct. The first, in this fiscal year we are actually going to have a net increase in the budget, in '94-95 of \$179,000 and then in '95-96 would begin the first construction and in '96-97 that would be I believe the...towards the end of that construction, when you back out the boot camps, the total effect would be 1.1 and 2.7.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Is any of this in the Appropriations Committee bill?

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: No, and the rationale was we already had the bill, the language is already there so it should be in the A bill.
