

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. I rise somewhat reluctantly to, I guess not to support the IPP motion, but certainly to concur a little bit in what Senator Chambers is doing, but I guess for a little bit different reason. My thought is not related at all to the welfare bill or to the crime bill or to anything else. My thought is related more to consent calendar and the concept of it. The Lincoln newspaper I think has scolded us on numerous occasions about the use of consent calendar. I have always viewed it as a necessary evil. There is a lot of things that have to be done, but we make mistakes. This body has shown that when we make mistakes that's okay, and we can't...we are not willing to go back and put those types of things in order. And I think at this point then we have to look at...

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Abboud or Lynch. Pass over that amendment. Oh, excuse me, here is Senator Abboud. Senator Abboud.

SENATOR ABOUD: Do you have a page number?

CLERK: It is not printed, Senator. It is relatively short. (Read AM3751.)

SENATOR ABOUD: Thank you, Mr. President, colleagues. This particular amendment was actually Senator Lynch's bill that he had up earlier, don't have the bill number right in front of me.
