farmer would recommend that a farmer get a loan which might be for one day's use and the payback is \$15 per \$100 of that loan for that one day's use. So if you get a 1,000 dollar loan, there are ten 100 dollar increments or units in that loan, so what's ten times fifteen? A hundred and fifty dollars for using that \$1,000 for one day. Who wouldn't like that? See, we're not talking about a year. We're talking about one day. Think about it. That's all I'll say on the return motion. But I wanted that into the record so when I comment on the amendment itself I won't have to speak as long to make a point.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Madam President and members, Senator Landis, I guess I need to ask you a question.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Landis.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I apologize. This is totally foreign to me. I do not remem...I must not have been here on the debate for this before. Was this a consent calendar, by chance, or it's...

SENATOR LANDIS: I think...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...really neither here nor there, but I...

SENATOR LANDIS: ...it was a consent calendar. I...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. I...

SENATOR LANDIS: We did not have an extended debate on it when it came up.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I have really serious reservations about this. It's a total new concept to me and I would like, if you're willing to give a thumbnail sketch of the reason for this bill, because at this point I don't think I can vote for it. And there may be a compelling reason for it and I would be very interested in it.

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Wehrbein, you are asking about what the nature of this business is and let me explain it to you...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: The reason that we have the bill.
