SENATOR PEDERSEN: Okay, withdraw that one.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: It is withdrawn.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read LB 988 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT ROBAK: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 988 pass with the emergency clause attached? All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Record vote read. See page 2122 of the Legislative Journal.) The vote is 45 ayes, 1 nay, 2 present and not voting, 1 excused and not voting.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: LB 988 passes with the emergency clause attached. Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Madam President, I ask for a point of personal privilege. In the history of our country we have had some great debates.
