

SENATOR LINDSAY: This is a tough vote. PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. The question before you is the motion to override the gubernatorial veto. All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote nay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: A record vote.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Please record.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Lindsay, I just might indicate to the membership that all veto override votes are record votes, just so you know. (Record vote read. See page 2134 of the Legislative Journal.) 22 ayes, 27 nays, Madam President, on the motion.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The motion fails. Next motion, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Hall has the next motion. Senator Hall would move that the Governor's line-item veto with regards to the textbook loan program become law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Madam President and members, based on the last vote, I am not going to waste the body's time. I would respectfully withdraw that motion.
