

SENATOR LINDSAY: So it's...you have to serve the seven days before you get the seven days.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Before you get the seven days.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Right.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Pirsch. Senator Witek, followed by Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR WITEK: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I've missed some of this discussion but I kind of marked this bill to watch because two years ago when we changed the good time reduction to I think it was fourteen days...seven days for every fourteen days, there was no good time provision at all, at that time, at the county level? Senator Lindsay, when you brought that bill in two years ago...

SPEAKER WITHEM: Is that a question for Senator Lindsay?

SENATOR WITEK: It is.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: I am trying to...I am trying to remember that, Senator Witek. I do know that it was done in 1344 last year; 1344 was amended into LB 1328. We IPP'd 1344 then and advanced 1328 to the floor, and 1328 ran out of time, so it was never considered on the floor. The bill you are talking about, I just don't recall. Maybe...

SENATOR WITEK: Two years ago I believe there was a bill that changed, that applied good time to county time served, and I believe it was your bill, Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: It probably was but...

SENATOR WITEK: And at that time there was no good time, just as three years ago, there was either no good time at the state level or they again lowered the good time at the state level. So I guess what I'm saying is there seems to be every year or two years an attempt to either broaden good time, lengthen good time, give more good time. I just wonder, you know, why should
