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farmer on his own property, Arthur Kirk, and I felt it was homicide, murder, and that's what I called it. And there were changes brought about in how the State Patrol does things as a result and people showed me literature in his house that would show that he was what people would call a racist. And I told them you all didn't go there and kill him because he's a racist so don't bring that to me now to try to stop me from pointing out the wrongful act of the State Patrol. The World-Herald is fearful, and maybe justifiably so to some extent, of this so-called common law court movement. I told you all the other day that I've been contacted by those people because some of them I have worked with in the past and I would be...they would like to recruit some of them, and they'd probably get in trouble if it's known, want to recruit me as one of their judges because of my knowledge and I'm also viewed as an outsider. The so-called militia movement in Nebraska contains people that I have worked with and that I know, all of them white. That's the irony. All of these groups that are looked down upon and held in contempt, viewed with suspicion and alarm by other white people are the ones that I can work with. They had plastic explosives. They had land mines. They had fully automatic machine guns. They even had what some of you old-timers will know, you know what this is, Browning automatic rifle. They had all kind of weaponry. They offered weapons to me because they thought that I would be in need of them because of the positions that I take in the things that I do, but I let them know that that's not my way of operating. But I'll tell you what, there are people who wake up in the morning and have no idea that by sundown they're going to be something entirely different from what they were when they woke up. Things can happen between sunrise and sunset that will alter a person's fate and destiny in a way that he or she could not envision. I cannot say that I will always try to get things done through a legislative process. Do as Senator Beutler and others say you ought to do. Call it streamlining or, as Senator Withem might characterize it, as facilitating the getting to of important issues. But in the process every one of these rules is aimed at squelching those ideas that a majority of the body does not want to hear or that a special interest group does not want the body to deal with and I know that I'm going to be in that position...
