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pay them?

SENATOR HILGERT: Well, you know, that is...that's an important point.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Okay.

SENATOR HILGERT: We certainly are willing to work with you in the meantime and on Select File if we need an amendment.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: All right.

SENATOR HILGERT: I'll most certainly do that.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Okay, thank you. I don't want to take any more time.

SENATOR HILGERT: Sure.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Crosby, members of the Legislature, Senator Hilgert, could you look at one other thing while you're looking at Senator Wickersham's...

SENATOR HILGERT: I didn't hear you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Hilgert.

SENATOR HILGERT: Sure.

SENATOR ABBOD: ...problem. Could you look at also number subsection (4), which it purports to exempt these types of activities from violations of the Uniform Deceptive Trade Practices Act. I'll give you a chance to comment. Perhaps I don't understand entirely what's going on, likely that I don't. But the Uniform Trade Practices Act has to do as much with how you do something as it does with what you do. And things like causing confusion and misunderstanding, being intentionally deceptive about what it is you're presenting, those types of things, seems to me should be equally applicable to a charitable kind of activity as it is to a commercial activity. And I really don't understand, or it seems to me, at least, that
