But I was showing Senator Beutler on this blue sheet, we probably would have gotten through with prob...maybe 20 bills, I didn't count them, 20 bills without me having much to say about any of them. But now you have forced me to have to deal with every one of them because Senator Maurstad slapped me and challenged me in the way that duels were arranged in the past. My honor has been wounded and I must have satisfaction. And if the rest of the Legislature is going to go along with what is being done here, then every day is going to be like what we have here; few people in the Chamber and me talking. And the public is going to say, well, those scoundrels and scalawags told us that if they pass that change in the rules everything is different. You can't believe nothing they tell you. If the word went out that we got Chambers in the box, we have stopped filibusters, we've entered a new era, quoting Senator Beutler; this is a new beginning, and they said new beginning of what, a new beginning of the same old thing. He's worse now than he was before. There was a parable Jesus said, he was talking about throwing devils out of people. Whether that can be done or not, I don't know, but he said the only way a person can overcome a strong man is to be stronger than he. You enter the strong man's house, you throw him out, you sweep it and clean it. And if you're not careful, that demon is what he was talking about will come back and reinhabit the house, and the state of that man is worse then than it was at the first. It's worse, worse than it was at the beginning. Before, they had an occasional bill that I might be strongly opposed to. Now they are compelling me to deal with every bill. They would say, Ernie, you're not compelled, and I would counter, what compels you to do what you're doing here? Senator Maurstad was not completely wrong. He said if something presented itself which seemed to me to be the right thing to do for the institution, I would do it. He was right to this extent. This, that I am doing, is the right thing for the institution, but it's the last such thing I'll do. I'm trying to save the Legislature from itself. They are acting in haste.

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They're acting in anger. They feel frustration. In other words, all those emotions that a child feels when the child wants a cookie and the parent won't give it
