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would move to return the bill for a specific amendment. Senator, your amendment is...I'm sorry, your motion, Senator, is to bracket the bill until April 22, 1998.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers, you're recognized on your motion to return from Final Reading.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And this is on 93...okay, now we're together. Members of the Legislature, I have not approved of this bill from the beginning. I've battled it hard and long, not as long as on some occasions as was with other bills, because I opposed it. That was on General File. On Select File it was a little different story. Then bless Peter, what should happen? After you all have prostrated yourselves before the business community, after you had raised your little spindly arms on high and shouted, hosanna, hosanna to the business community, what did they do? In an article dated February 9 of the Omaha World Herald, the subheadline 'Losing Confidence in Politicians, Business Leaders Consider a Ballot Initiative to Control State Spending.' This is what the article says in part: "Some of Nebraska's most prominent business executives say they might bypass the Legislature with an initiative limiting government spending because they are losing confidence in the state's politicians. 'The confidence factor is minimal that the Legislature would gather enough votes to make progress,' said Bob Eihusan, chairman and chief executive officer of Chief Industries Inc. in Grand Island."
