the different zoning standards. They just, you know, I think that, and then the fact that you've got a year 2000 sunset, would preclude a number of counties in our state from being able to do any zoning at all. Senator Hilgert hits the nail on the head when he asked why didn't they do this before? But we are a reactive society, and react when the need is there. This thing came to my attention probably in July this year, maybe June, last year. That's how long it's been an issue, and once it got to the forefront, it's all I did all summer. I started answering the phone at seven-thirty or seven in the morning, and I'd go to work at the ranch, and come back and have calls to make until ten-thirty or eleven at night. That went on for weeks. But the people that I talked to were the farmers and ranchers right there in my district that were having difficulties with what was going on. And what was going on was that there were people coming into our state, and they were digging holes in the ground right beside these farms and ranches to plant these mega-hog plants without telling anybody about them, without going to them and being neighborly, without saying, look, Jack Smith, this is what I am doing and we'd like for your approval. That didn't happen. The first thing these farmers and ranchers knew, the heavy equipment was in there and the dirt was being moved. Well, I've been there long enough to know when you move that dirt, it moves itself. One particular case, they bared over forty acres of nothing but sand, and we've spent years getting ten acres of nothing but sand healed up. Absolutely no regard for the soil, no regard for the people. One of the things that I wanted to bring to your attention today is that one of these individuals that did this is called DeCoster Farms, and you'll probably hear people deny that, but that's who it is, and the person who is doing it for them is a man by the name of Brian Mogensen. Let me read you a little bit about DeCoster Farms. This is a search from the Internet of the Telegraph Herald in Dubuque, Iowa, and we have headlines in the paper starting in January of '96. January '96, "Hog Farmer Lawsuit Political": The suit alleges water pollution and animal waste control violations at six separate DeCoster Farm sites in Wright, Hamilton, and Hardin Counties. July of '76 (sic): "South Dakota Bars DeCoster Hog Operations". From Mitchell, South Dakota, the headline, Associated Press: Failing to meet state requirements will bar a Clarinda, Iowa man from bringing his hog confinement operation to South Dakota.
