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in the state of Nebraska are going to care for those who cannot care for themselves. This is money that is needed. When we talk about responding to those outside this body who talk about, well, we're wasting money, and we have no ability to restrain ourselves, well, it's a question of priorities. Ninety million for a prison to lock people up, I supported it, I'm not criticizing it. But don't we have room left over for the developmentally disabled, these individuals who are in circumstances where their caregivers are over the age of 60? Can you imagine the fear, and the angst, and the anxiety that these people must be undergoing right now. If I get sick, if I develop heart disease, if I somehow lose the piddling income that I have, if I die, who's going to care for my child? Good point, Senator, brings up insurance. So I, with no apologies, in fact with pride, am going to support the Wesely amendment. This is a good vote, this is a good vote. Senator Lynch brought up some very valid points, kind of the...brought us a little bit less emotion and more realism and as far as how is the state caring for people and the millions of dollars we're spending on computer systems and so forth. We need to put this money in the budget. We need to care for the developmentally disabled. We need to eliminate the waiting list. We need to send a clear message to those Nebraskans who are caring for developmentally disabled children, even though they may be adults, but they are their children,...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR HILGERT: ...that, don't worry, don't worry, your community, your fellow Nebraskans are here, we're not going to let you down, we're not going to let you down. So I'm voting for this amendment, for my buddy. Thank you.
