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down in Maryland which has some clout around the country, Sports Illustrated. It started to be taken seriously. Then it moved from the comic pages through the sports pages through the editorial pages to the news columns. And the rationale is simple. These young men perform the work of those who play professional football and the professional football players are rewarded handsomely. But the control over these young men's life is greater than that which a professional football team management holds or exercises over professional football players. For those who are not aware of it, a football player who comes to this or any other big-time football factory on a scholarship cannot hold a job unless it's during vacation time, and that is not enough time to earn money to go to school and take care of the needs that a person has in addition to what they call an athletic scholarship. So, the realm of big-time college football is shot through and through with what are called violations of NCAA rules. Those letters stand for the National Collegiate Athletic Association. This is a confederacy. It is a private operation. It is not governmental in nature and we, as a state, should not allow it to impose on the residents of this state, and whoever is a member of the football team is a resident of this state, those kind of provisions which would not be tolerated anywhere else. They play a very dangerous game. It should not even be called a game. If you look at the equipment you will see that it's designed to protect the skull, the neck, the limbs, the back, the ribs and every part of the body. These young men wind up with broken necks, fractured spines, whether it's in the cervical area or further down. It's not uncommon to play with a strained ankle or a stress fracture or some kind of stretched or torn ligament. You get shot up with various narcotics so that you can play. The reason these things are done is that these young men are not viewed as students. They are not recruited by the University of Nebraska to be students. They are recruited to be athletes. The proof of it, and everybody knows it, if one of these young men is a marginal student but a top-of-the-line football player, he will have no trouble staying at the school. As one of these...they call them academic advisors, it happened not to be at Nebraska because they're not that clever or either that honest, this academic advisor, when asked how do you go about keeping an athlete eligible, this academic advisor, so-called, said, I could keep a cockroach eligible for three years, and
