that I believe Nebraska is different than some of the other states that have been concerned about the megahog operations and the fact that we do have a Department of Environmental Quality that has been working. We do have rules in place that many other states did not have. So now I believe the concern of additional personnel that we have been trying to address is certainly a question that we have to come to some agreement on what is the appropriate number. But it will certainly help us meet our objectives in all of the areas. I do support Senator Schellpeper's amendment, particularly the issue of odor as was first addressed in the committee amendments. On page 1, line 21, it talked about "control odor where appropriate." That simply was too broad of a statement that hopefully, as Senator Schellpeper said, we will now have a committee that will look in to defining "odor," look at the technology, and that is something certainly in agriculture that we're seeing a great deal of that might help us in this area. So I think in all of our discussions, no matter what side you are on, we have been trying to find some balance, some balance in protecting our environment, the waters of the state, and also some balance in protecting the livestock industry, which is very important to the economy of our state. In fact, and I don't know if anyone has shared that, of Nebraska's total cash receipts from all agriculture commodities, over 60 percent do come from the livestock industry. Of all of the grain that is produced in the state...
