recent years, they've had attached to them term limits proposals. I, personally, think those are two separate issues and they should be addressed in two separate resolutions. This...this particular issue has been introduced as a resolution in this year's Congress, HJ Resolution 18 on January 6th by Representative Stump, and it basically asking for the four-year terms. With that, Madam President, I think I could just safely say that this is an issue that does have bipartisan support. It's an issue that I want you to think about seriously and I would be happy to answer any questions that you might have. I might also say that, should a resolution ever pass Congress, both Houses of Congress, then it would come back to the states for either a vote of three-fourths of the Legislatures or a vote of three-fourths of conventions called for that purpose in each state. Thank you very much.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Schimek. You've heard the opening on LR 10. Any discussion? There are no lights, Senator Schimek. Would you like to close?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Madam President, I know when to quit when I'm ahead. I think I will just waive closing.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you. Thank you. The question is the advancement to E & R of LR 10. All in favor vote aye, opposed no. We're voting on LR 10. Have you all voted? Record, please.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 2 nays, Madam President, on the advancement of LR 10.

SENATOR CROSBY: LR 10 advances. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Madam President, LR 11, a resolution proposed by Senator Kristensen. (Read brief explanation.) The resolution was introduced on January 12 of this year, Madam President. At that time it was referred to the Government, Military, and Veterans Affairs Committee. The resolution was advanced to General File. I have no amendments at this time, Madam President.
