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SENATOR DW. PEDERSEN: Give my time to Kermit.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Madam Chair, members of the body, if I can continue. And I really, I really mean this, the green exhibit, which will be coming around, you can see...you can see what's happening from an exhibit earlier distributed. When we adopted LB 775, we began to repopulate. And now just recently we, as a total state, urban and rural, agriculture and business, need to be concerned about what it was that we suffered with for more than seven decades, which was we had no growth. Many here may want to debate to what extent LB 775 did not, all by itself alone, solve that problem. But I doubt that anyone will argue that LB 775 didn't contribute anything to the regrowth and the repopulation and the improvement in our economy. But at a time when we are concerned about the future of agriculture as it relates to keeping young people on the farm, it is a time when we also need to be concerned about the onset again of an out-migration that was very, very deleterious in terms of its effect upon our economy. And I don't direct your attention to the green exhibit that itemizes \$373 million worth of agricultural tax exemptions, because I'm trying to make this urban-rural. That isn't my point. My amendments will all propose that whatever amount of money we use, whether it be the \$1.6 million that Senator Wehrbein originally offered for the green copy, or whether it be the \$30 million fund that the Revenue Committee, by its amendment, is now proposing to establish for this good purpose. My proposal will be that we all share together. But if we reduce, if we reduce LB 775 credits by 6 percent, let's reduce agricultural tax exemptions by 6 percent, and we will together, as one Nebraska, help create the fund that makes it possible then to "incentivize" our young agriculturalists. If we decide that we don't need to increase so quickly to a \$30 million fund, as suggested by the Revenue Committee, then I will tell you that we can raise together, together, we can raise all the money necessary to fund Senator Wehrbein's original bill with a 1 percent reduction in LB 775 credits, and a 1 percent reduction in agricultural tax exemptions. And then we together can address this particular issue for young agriculture, just as we together address the needs of business and job creation with LB 775, and just as we
