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have little or no effect on youth. To believe that, which I know a number of you do, you have to ignore the National Economics Bureau, you have to ignore the Center for Disease Control, you have to ignore the National Academy of Sciences, you have to ignore the National Cancer Institute, you have to ignore the Governor of Alaska, the Health Department of Arizona, and the Health Department of Oregon, so that instead you reach into your soul, as Senator Coordsen suggests, and remember your days as a teenager, or listen to four teenage girls from Lincoln Southeast. You have to dismiss that body of evidence and place your faith into one of those two sources, based on our debate here, to come to the conclusion...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...this will have no effect on youth. It will, about 5,000 youth will have their lives lengthened by this amendment. I ask you to adopt it.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: You've heard the closing. The question before the body is the adoption of the Landis amendment to the committee amendments. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: If it's still possible, I'll ask for a roll call vote.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Landis has requested a roll call vote in reverse order. Members, please hold your conversations to a minimum so the Clerk can read the roll. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken, Legislative Journal page 1424.) 24 ayes, 23 nays, Mr. President, on the amendment.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: The amendment is not adopted. I raise the call. Debate on the committee amendments? Senator Schimek. I'm sorry, Senator Schimek, you had called the question. I had not erased your light. Senator Price. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Actually, Mr. Speaker, I think there is a priority motion on the desk. I'm asking, if it's not a priority motion, then the adoption of the committee amendments comes
