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particular, to foster care that I think are in a violent mode that need some other kind of place, so that's what I want you to include, a discussion with them, with Health and Human Services, that why do they do this, because in my district we've had two murders, go ahead, from that one house.

SENATOR THOMPSON: The youth that are placed...they can be placed currently either by, and LB 610 is going to deal a little bit with this, but the kids that we're talking about today are adjudicated juveniles. Sometimes juveniles are not...are still in the process and are being held.

SENATOR CROSBY: I understand that. I understand that.

SENATOR THOMPSON: And they may be in group homes...

SENATOR CROSBY: Um-hum.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...or foster care. Sometimes the youth aren't charged. I think one of the troublesome issues is that these two kids, I mean there are...there are children who do things that are inappropriate, they cause property crimes and so forth, but most of the kids, and when you hear the profiles, I think one of the most telling comments that we heard when we were at Geneva was a question that Senator Jensen asked when we were meeting with the psychiatrist there and they were talking about what kind of programming needs they had and 85 percent of the girls at Geneva have been sexually abused. There are so many problems that a lot of these kids are dealing with--substance abuse problems, behavior problems--but also some things in their own families that need to be addressed that might...this is, I know this is a concern and I know that a study was done a few years ago of the kids at Kearney and Geneva and kids in group homes. This was during...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...the Nelson administration when Mary Dean Harvey was there, and the profiles were very similar,...

SENATOR CROSBY: I understand that.
