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SENATOR BRASHEAR: Well, I was going to listen thoughtfully to the debate, but I...I'm inclined to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If the language is clear, what is there to think about and what can be added by the debate, other than confusion? (Laugh)

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Well, I don't know, you're debating it, so (laugh) that's why I was going to listen.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, actually, you and I are not debating, because we've been in agreement. We're on the same side. We're kind of having, to use your term, is it a colloquy?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: It's a colloquy.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We're having a colloquy. (Laugh) I like that word. Is that...would you agree that's what we're having now?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Something like that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Members of the Legislature, I'm going to support Senator Bromm's amendment. And, if people do have questions, it probably is good that they be raised so that the record can show that all aspects of the bill were discussed. And Senator Brashear's amendment triggered a lot of discussion that I think is wholesome, I think it does provide a record, a clear record of what the Legislature's intent is with reference to this legislation, the purpose to be achieved and the steps taken to reach that desired result. Senator Bromm's amendment makes it clear now that we're talking about, at most, a five-day period between the time the packer gets the beasts and the time that the packer slaughters them. I have a question about this, but I'm not going to raise it, because I'm not in the industry, and maybe the question that immediately occurs to me is not one that would ever arise in the real world, so I won't even pose it. Thank you, Mr. President, that's all I have.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Raikes, on the Bromm amendment.
