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talked about that...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...for service, that there would be some addition. If you read the fiscal note, I believe it's 14.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Yes.

SENATOR BOHLKE: But I laid out the possibility, if you look at the number of phone calls each of those may receive, and certainly as I began to look at the experience of Colorado, unless those concerns are addressed, I believe what we should do as a state is immediately move to ask for a waiver, looking at the track record that the state currently has at how we're meeting our obligations, the waiting periods. And then in the answers of Senator Brown that are in the bill, that allow for the delays, are the very reasons for any delays that are now happening in the county. And it looks to me like the centralized collection system will be allowed to make those same delays. So then what are we accomplishing? And so those are issues that certainly...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...are drawing my attention and concern.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, colleagues. I've been sitting here this morning trying to absorb as much of this as I could, because I came into this debate not knowing for sure what I would do. I certainly had misgivings about losing the amount of money that we're threatened to lose, but I also have been on the end of this thing, where you try to enforce child support, you work with the county clerks and you try to get the child support collected and out to the people as best you can. And I happen to represent counties that do a pretty darn good job of that. And I also factor into my mind the recent problems that we've all seen with the partnership project, and HHS, and all of the dilemmas and work that is surrounding that and the frustrations that are surrounding that. I also tried to factor
