5 percent increase. Some of those were significant in some of the agencies in increase in health insurance. Community colleges show an increase of \$10,861,000. County jail cost reimbursement, that's per LB 8...695 last year, started kicking in this year to the counties, property tax relief, if you will, of \$6.8 million. Aid to local schools, our TEEOSA, is \$4.2 million, and that may be confusing because that reflects the increase of the \$19 million that we actually did but, because some of that was programmed in, these increases show up here as \$4.2 million. Most of the \$19 million actually came in as a...a...above what we allocated.... Well, let's see, how do I want to say it? We had programmed in, in the status, some increase, not as much as the \$19 million, and that's what this reflects so that it's some above the status but more than last year. I guess I'm trying to walk around that, but, anyway, it only shows a 4.2 over previous year's status. Low-level nuclear waste shows an increase, licensing, that's because of the lawsuit, of \$5.7 million. Regional centers and mental health, \$5.2 million. That's...we replaced federal money with cash in order to keep both the regional centers and our community-based mental health programs going for another year relative to working out the decision process in the regional centers versus community-based programs. We actually are running fairly...two fairly strong programs--community-based and regional center programs--and, until we get this sorted out another year, we are continuing both programs. This is going to be studied extensively this next...next year by the present administration. Special education, if you recall, goes up 3 percent a year. That's reflected in the \$7.8 million. The water litigation, Wyoming and Kansas, showing a 2.9 increase the first year and a little bit less in the second year, as we had significant money in it last year that was reduced somewhat by estimate, realizing these are strictly estimates at this point. We are due to go to trial this fall on the Wyoming litigation and we're still...a lot of the money we're spending on the Kansas litigation is collection of data and facts. We are going to have an update on this lawsuit this Thursday for the committee and for Natural Resources Committee. Once again, these are estimates. This...with these appropriations this year, Wyoming lawsuit is about \$22 million. I don't...we're just really getting started on the Kansas lawsuit. Upgrade with Health and Human Services data processing, 2.9, nearly 3 million dollars. Other items
