is to get something passed into law. There is a provision in the statute that says people who want to get liquor licenses, I believe it may still be there, a license to sell liquor, you have to be a person of good moral character. And as I've said repeatedly, I don't see where good moral character has anything whatsoever to do with selling liquor. I don't see anything wrong with Senator Brashear's amendment. I don't see anything wrong with saying that you can have three violations in one year. We're talking about business and, brothers and sisters, the business of America is business. Young Senator Smith, you're closer to school than most of us, but if you put on your thinking cap, you may remember the president who made that remark. Is Senator Brashear...oh, I'd like to ask Senator Brashear a question.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Brashear, will you yield?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Madam Chair.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, I thought you were serious in offering the amendment, but in listening to you, you're not really too serious about this amendment, are you? Or are you?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Well, I'm...yes, I'm serious about the amendment. I simply am approaching it a little differently than sometime...we...you approach different issues differently on the floor, depending on the subject matter.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if you're serious about it, I'm going to support it, but if it's just, you know just one of those...

SENATOR BRASHEAR: I said what I believe and I believe what I said, okay, I'm serious about it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...things, now I've got...now I've got it, okay. So you're not going to be withdrawing this amendment or anything like that, after I've sat up here and voiced my support?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: No, I'm not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, thank you. At least I can get that much.
