Senator Chambers, I now have your next amendment, Senator, FA158. (FA158, Legislative Journal page 1804.)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this, this amendment is profound, so you have to pay close attention. On page 1, again dealing in the intent section, in line 13, I would strike the word "will", skip over two words, then reinsert the word "will", so that we will not split that verb. We put the helper right up against the verb. And because in the first part of the sentence we're talking about you "can generate", you put the "can" right in front of the "generate". The helper is right attached to the verb. You hitch the cart to the horse. But when we get farther along in the sentence we don't use parallel grammatical construction. We put two words between the helper and the verb. So what I want to do is make this grammatical by striking "will" where it appears and putting it after the word "turn" so that we have the construction "will generate" to go along with "can generate", which is the construction in the first part of the bill. Now that I think that that amendment is understandable, I'm going to ask Senator Landis if he's had a chance to look at that term "lease purchase" which is on page 2, line 19.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond, Senator Landis?

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes, Senator Chambers, I will. A lease purchase bond is a revenue bond, and it's a revenue bond that is secured against an income stream that comes from a lease purchase agreement. Let me give you an example. The Lincoln State Office Building was built by the city of Lincoln because the state government promised to lease the whole building and to pay it off. That pro...that body of proceeds was then used to retire what the...what the city of Lincoln had as a revenue
