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public hearing. That would be a new statute, a new bill that needs...probably needs some debate and discussion and the public an opportunity to testify. But I think it's just...it's very important for people to realize what we have done and what we haven't done; but maybe even more importantly, what they've been doing and what they can still do. And we haven't done anything to change people who want to continue to do something that's against the law. Perhaps they didn't know it. And I give any remainder of my time back to the Chair. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN PRESIDING

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Hilgert.

SENATOR HILGERT: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would Senator Bromm please yield to a question?

SENATOR BROMM: Yes.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR HILGERT: Senator Bromm, now, isn't it...I too don't want to be disingenuous to the people that we represent, and I think, kind of, we are with that...with our last remarks here. Right now, isn't it currently the law that you can have an open container in a bus or a limousine?

SENATOR BROMM: It's not illegal to have the open container.

SENATOR HILGERT: That's right. So right now, no one's breaking the law by doing that.

SENATOR BROMM: Only when they consume it.

SENATOR HILGERT: That's right. Now, you don't see a nuance in that that is applicable to anyone that currently drives a bus? Or do you think that this is an enhancement of the law? Don't you think this would be easier and...to enforce at this point?

SENATOR BROMM: I don't understand, Senator Hilgert.

SENATOR HILGERT: Don't you think it'd be easier to enforce...if
