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and degraded because there's a tendency for the oppressed to identify with the oppressor. I must turn on my light again.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion on the Tyson amendment to the Schimek amendment to LB 480, Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the body. Senator Chambers again is using his imagination as a source for his factual statements. I'm not making a statement on this. I'm trying to make a bill that I don't like any part of acceptable. Why don't I like any part of it? Because, if you look at the handout I passed out yesterday, the objectives of this bill are already being met and will continue to be met by the Health and Human Services System and its director, Mr. Ross. There is a list of what he has done to date. I don't have a long list of what he intends to do, but I did provide on that list which came from Health and Human Services a list of what they are doing now. If you want redundancy in government, which is expense in government, if you want further tax expenditures, this is the way to go about it. It is not an acceptable bill. I am making it to where at least it becomes partially acceptable. That's all. Senator Chambers' fantasies and illusions about any number of subjects shouldn't be brought to bear on this. I urge you to look at this and see whether or not this is an acceptable amendment to you, and vote accordingly without reference to the fairy tales that Senator Chambers is so expert at spreading. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: ...Senator Tyson. Further discussion, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, victims are never consulted relative to their condition and the oppressors are the ones who are very quick to say they're dealing in illusion, but the oppressors are trying to get people to deal in delusion. Senator Tyson would probably argue that black people have nothing to say because the 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution freed us from slavery, prohibited discrimination, gave us the right to vote, so there's no need for additional legislation because the Constitution says it all. But we know that despite amendments to the U.S.
