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experience, was it necessary to have denied in journalism class what she learned in history class, and shouldn't we do what we can in an appropriate way to minimize that what seemed to be an hypocrisy to her? And I think in part that that is what this is all about, that freedom itself is a great teacher and that these students, they need to learn the boundaries of fair play. And in learning those boundaries, they will inevitably confront the reasons for each rule and ask, what is fair and what is good for society, and why do we do it this way? And those are all the reoccurring questions that Americans ask that make America great. If you do not have that freedom, you do not exercise your mind or stretch it.
