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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this...this would amend the date to April 1st. I think somebody wants to say something, so I will...sure. I will continue. Everybody knows that the date April 1st is designated April Fool's Day. I don't know where that came from, but I think that would be a perfect day to resume the discussion of this bill if it is discussed again at all. So, a bracket motion at this stage in...of consideration would kill the bill. I think our last day is scheduled to be April the 7th, or somewhere around the first week or 10 days of April. There is no way that a bill that is not prioritized has any chance if it's taken off the agenda by any means. If Senator Hilgert makes his cloture motion and loses, then it cannot be left on the agenda. And if it comes back, he cannot make another bracket...cloture motion for two more hours. So we would have set a record. He should make his bracket motion and it will lose. Then let "Senator" Radcliffe get together all of his forces and powers and whatever else he has at his disposal and get it back on the agenda, and then we'll go two more hours, which will be ten hours, on an eight-hour bill, and then maybe the bracket...I meant the cloture motion will prevail and maybe the body will vote to move the bill. But after this motion is voted down I am going to go into that part of the bill that deals with that money, that property, that value which the landlord can take, and I defy anybody on this floor, Senator Quandahl or Senator Hilgert, to show where once the landlord takes somebody's property it's a set-off or an amount deducted from that which is claimed to be owed by the tenant. And you see the position that I've put them in. They cannot defend their bill. They cannot defend what they've been...what they're doing because they've been given their instructions. They cannot challenge anything that I say on this because they've been told what their orders are. And I'm not going to put them in a position to violate their orders. You think I would ask Senator Quandahl a question other than the innocuous kind the other day and get him in trouble with the lobby? No, because he's a brand new senator, not even elected the first time. And, like I said, those kind of senators will tell people anybody can get elected. The thing to do is to be a senator who wasn't elected. And I read where he's going to run
