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tenants, but I venture to say if any of them were invited to a meeting and there were 500 people there, and they were not told that these people were tenants, how boldly would they stand up to those tenants and say, yeah, we supported a law that would say the landlord can take \$1,000 worth of your property, the landlord can keep it, sell it or destroy it. They would be hemming and hawing and trying to explain, say, well you know, ah, there's...ah, ah, there's ah...inflation. And the landlords would not be there to back them up. "Governor" Radcliffe would not be there to back them up. They'd be on their own as slipping and sliding politicians who are going to have to make things look like what they're not and make things that are not look like they are something else. That's what it will be like. And they'll point fingers and blame others, but they will not boldly say that, yeah, I thought that they should have doubled the deposit; yeah, I thought they should have quadrupled this amount that they can steal; yes, I'm the one who thought they should shorten the number of days that you have to get in court and challenge some of these things, I went for all of that; now, what are you going to do about it? No, that wouldn't be their approach. You need to go to some of these gatherings, where these senators talk to people, and listen, and you'll see an entirely different person from what they are here when they're speaking against or voting against the interests of the poor or the helpless or the voiceless. They'll be very bold here, but out there is something else. It's like the difference between Clark Kent and Superman. On this floor when it comes to pummeling the weak and the defenseless they're Superman; when it comes to the campaign trail they're Clark Kent and they want sympathy, and they want to pretend that what they've done they did not do. When Jonathan Swift was talking about selling these children for food, he was mentioning how the women who had these children could make eight shillings for the child, and this is one of the things he gave, as he was summing up, as a reason for accepting his...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...his idea. "Secondly, the poorer tenants will have something valuable of their own, which by law may be made liable to distress and help to pay their landlord's rent, their corn and cattle being already seized, and money a thing
