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SENATOR MATZKE: I...I don't see that that question is relevant to the bill before us.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you know the answer? That's all I'm asking, because I cannot proceed if you don't know the answer to that question.

SENATOR MATZKE: Well, I've already...I've already answered it, Senator Chambers. I think it's up to the court to take judicial notice of whatever it deems appropriate and necessary under those circumstances.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Matzke. The only reason I asked you these questions, Senator Engel said you knew about this bill and the law, so I will not interrogate you, because my aim is not to show what somebody doesn't know, but I was told that you did, so I have no more questions of you on this point. Members of the Legislature, we're going to be on this bill for a while today and other days, and rather than just tell you things, I'm going to give you wording from the Nebraska Supreme Court about ordinances. When you talk about the confusion in this bill, you have a glimmer of it with what Senator Matzke told you. He said that there might be a different standard for determining one of these violations under the law of another state and the court takes judicial notice of that law. Well, how does anybody know what the law is? The court itself might say that is so broad as to be unconstitutional and an attempt to intrude into the work of the court, because the court is not going to let itself be put in a position of a political nature because politicians are trying to make a political point. This is very unwise, ill-advised material. If what Senator Matzke said is true about the standard in Kansas being different from that in Nebraska for determining a violation, then a conviction in Kansas could not be used in Nebraska. Now Senator Engel probably knows the answer to that question, so I want to ask him that question. Senator Engel, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Engel, would you respond to a question?

SENATOR ENGEL: Yes, um-hum.
