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SENATOR QUANDAHL: I guess I have a couple of questions on this and probably the first of which is are you aware are there any other constitutional amendments that are appearing on the primary ballot?

SENATOR STUHR: I am not sure, but if there...I'm not sure. I can't...I cannot answer that question.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Okay. And is there any cost involved or would there be any cost involved in getting this put on the primary ballot at this time?

SENATOR STUHR: No, not to...not to my knowledge. The reason that was expressed is that we do have people that do vote in the primary ballot that maybe study the issues a little more in detail and that was one of the reasons that I changed to have it placed on this ballot.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Okay. Is there any, I mean outside of what you just said there as far as people that study the ballot issues maybe a little more closely in primaries, is there any other compelling reason or emergency that it needs to be placed on the primary as opposed to the general?

SENATOR STUHR: None. I just...that...that was basically my consideration for moving it.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Quandahl. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, I don't think cost is any factor in this issue at all. That is not a factor. And I don't know exactly what Senator Quandahl meant by the term "emergency", but as Senator Stuhr, in her gentle, subtle way, excuse me, Senator Suttle, no pun intended, has tried to make clear, when people come out for the primary it's generally believed that you will have people who have paid a little more attention to the issues and they are not as likely to see this as maybe an attempt to repeal English as the official language, which is what I would like to see
