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this bill. I do think that eventually we'll talk about some of the other components and, as I said, I wish...if you have any questions about Wilderness Camp, the parole revocation, any of those things, talk to Mark Martin. He is so knowledgeable, as I said earlier. He is wonderful and he really knows all the ins and outs of the system and what happens to these children. So I don't know if I have any time left. Senator Thompson, if you want to talk to Senator Raikes again, you may have it.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Thompson, a minute and a half.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Senator Crosby. I do have a copy of the veto message and I will tell you what the money is being used for from last year. Nine hundred and...\$696,800 of fire and safety life projects, window projects relating to security, air conditioning improvements have been requested. Building allocations in the amount of \$238,725 have been approved. I'm just jumping through it. And \$485,075 is allocated for...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...accomplishing these projects. So I will get you a copy of what the money last year that wasn't vetoed was going to be used for. And to further answer the question, the department could not begin construction of this building if we don't add this amendment. It would be left open to some smaller projects, but it wouldn't be possible to begin a larger project.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Thompson, Senator Crosby. Further debate on AM2852, Senator Brown, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the Appropriations Committee deliberated on the issue of how to best meet the dilemma that we have with youth who are offenders, and a proposal that we had in front of us was the parole revocation facility. But we were unsure that...which would have served both girls and boys and would have been located in an urban area, and the idea behind parole revocation was for kids who had
