

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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March 14, 2000 LB 715, 968, 1135, 1217

CLERK: Thank you, Mr. President. Enrollment and Review reports LB 1135 as correctly engrossed. I have amendments to be printed: Senator Tyson, LB 1217; Senator Coordsen, LB 968; Senator Raikes, LB 715. (Legislative Journal pages 1068-1069.)

Mr. President, I have a priority motion. Senator Chambers would move to bracket LB 1217 until April 12th of this year.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open on your motion to bracket LB 1217.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, maybe a cooling off period is needed and maybe not, but as the discussion goes forward it demonstrates that not enough information was made available on this camp. The Appropriations Committee certainly didn't have it. This did not come in the form of a bill so there was no testimony on it. They were given advertisements. They were given promotional material and I don't believe this Appropriations Committee would have accepted that kind of a presentation as a basis for obliging the state to spend \$3 million a year for the next five years on anything that was...that they took seriously. But on this, you give it to them. I'd like to ask Senator Don Pederson a question or two.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Pederson, would you yield?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Pederson, when you're talking about this aftercare, is it true that the state and a private entity are going to have charge over this youngster?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: In the aftercare?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: The aftercare will be furnished by the Brown School facilities and so that...that's the extent of the involvement in the aftercare and then...and then the report would go back to Kearney.
