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SENATOR JENSEN: Under the bill, we would put a 24 limit...24-month limit on that.

SENATOR RAIKES: So, again, my question. Suppose I have a couple of children and my income is at 120 percent of poverty but I have received child support help for 24 months. Now, am I then eligible for no more child support help?

SENATOR JENSEN: Under the...under the bill, yes, that's the way the bill is drawn right now.

SENATOR RAIKES: And no...no safety net. In other words, whatever might have happened to me, unexpected or otherwise, once...once I've...

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, one, there...

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...there will be a study that will be done and that study will be completed yet this year, September, November, can't remember what I...what date...by November of this year, and we'll have the results of that and we should be able to make a determination of how (inaudible).

SENATOR RAIKES: Well, one last quick question, Senator, and thank you for that help. How much money are we going to save by putting...save in the sense that we're no longer going to pay child support help by putting in this 24-month limit, "we" being the citizens of the state?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, and if I can just for a minute, I'll...

SENATOR RAIKES: It has to be less than a minute, I think. I think we're getting close here.

SENATOR JENSEN: All right. Well, I'll turn my light on then and I'll speak to it. What caused a lot of the problems is...or not problems, but what brought the numbers up also is when we came out with the CHIP program. Nebraska was number one in the
