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understand.

SENATOR JENSEN: His administration gave me to understand that, yes, he did...yes, they did. I have not visited with the Governor.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then, if the Governor said that his administration members who talked to you did not properly communicate his views and that, after the study, if they think that it's necessary to make a change they will do so administratively, would you be offended if they came up with that kind of a statement?

SENATOR JENSEN: I would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, my final question. It is clear, though, that if we put in statute the status quo that could not be changed unless we, indeed, enacted a statute to change it.

SENATOR JENSEN: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, thank you. I'm going to be a fool one more time. They say even fools in love wake up one day, and I'm not in love, but I'm going to be a fool one more time. I'm going to believe that Senator Jensen...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...is telling us what the administration said, that we need not worry legislatively about this matter anymore unless we want to enact a law to change it from what it is. And if we do nothing legislatively, it will not change. Now, if somebody else on the floor understood it differently, I wish you'd say so now because I have no more time to talk and I don't want to offer a reconsideration motion, but I want it clear on the record what it is we're being told this agreement consists of.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Tyson, on the bracket motion.
