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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Wehrbein a question, or maybe two at the most.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein, do you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, I'm sure you read, and if you didn't the Governor was making some ominous rumblings about things he's going to veto. Have you talked to him about his view on this bill?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: No, I have not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you don't have any inkling of what his intentions with reference to this bill are.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I have no direct inkling. I...I read the paper like you do, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If this bill were to be vetoed, is it your intent to try to override?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I will not make a commitment on that at this point because it's depending on the status of the budget. At that time, that's one of the more difficult decisions of life, I feel, in this body, is to keep a balanced budget, and if you recall my previous history I will definitely commit to a balanced budget, and so the final decision will have to be left for that two week...in another couple weeks.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Members of the Legislature, I'm not going to take a lot of time on this A bill and I probably won't take much time on the underlying substantive bill. But before we vote on final passage, I'm going to try to find out what Senator Wehrbein's intentions are based on what the Governor might do. Because it was a very difficult thing for me to vote for that underlying bill in the first place. I don't want to go through all that agony for nothing, and when I say agony I don't mean that I'm going to die. I'm sorry if I gave you all a temporary upbeat feeling
