Legislature, I stated earlier that Senator Suttle knows how to draw fangs or extract fangs. Senator Coordsen knows how to take away the entire artillery that I had. Senator Coordsen, just so that I'm crystal clear and everybody else is, because some people were discussing the fiscal note, this bill has nothing to do with the terms of the green copy in terms of spending money. SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Okay. What I...thank you, Senator Coordsen. What I want to say is that I did come here prepared to battle on this bill for a number of reasons. I'm glad that I don't have to do that and I want to commend Senator Coordsen for hitching up his fiscal green belt so that we can get something in place that will give us some information, and once that information if procured my view may even moderate. But at this point, Senator Coordsen, I wouldn't even know enough to really be in a position to talk about supporting the green copy of LB 1124, but when we get good information, unfortunately I have to say this now, "Squire" Wehrbein has shown that my mind can be changed. That's not going to happen too often. But I believe that you've raised a very important issue; one which, no matter how I might feel in terms of agreeing or not, should be addressed fully and thoroughly and at some point something should be presented to the Legislature on it.
