own mind, this stands with the Governor along with every other issue, and that's true. You'll have to make your own decision on that as to what will or will not happen. But this is an effort to work through an issue that is of concern to at least the majority of this body in terms of minority recruitment, and I believe it should take its stand along with everything else. This is an effort here to really get at the core of that problem in addition to the scholarship money. But is true it's going to compete with everything else, in my mind.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. The question before the body is, shall the Wehrbein amendment to LB 1217 be adopted? All in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, please, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 3 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Wehrbein's amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The Wehrbein amendment is adopted to LB 1217.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Brashear has the next amendment. Senator, I'm led to believe you want to withdraw, is that right?

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: We are now open for discussion on the advancement of LB 1217 to E & F for engrossing. Senator Wehrbein, did you want to make a motion? Or, Senator Dierks, I'm sorry, Senator Dierks, your light is on.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Mr. President. I just wanted to take a moment to explain the red vote on that last one. I don't know how else to indicate my displeasure with the university than to do that. It would be difficult for me to vote no on all of LB 1217, although I might do that. But I am extremely disappointed in the arrogance that that institution has shown, and that was the reason for my red vote. Thank you.
